Letter from the Elders



Dear Friends,

The price is paid!

I'm pretty sure that no one really likes being in debt, but that at some stage in our lives we have all been in such a position, perhaps with a mortgage or credit card or other form of loan. It can sometimes feel like a weight around the neck which we are longing to be free of.

Our church has had to take on loans in the past and as you may know we recently had to take out a couple of loans from the Synod to help pay for the big building repairs project that was finally completed at the end of last year. From recent conversations with Nick, our Treasurer, we are just now in the position to pay off the outstanding balance of the first of these loans, which was for £15,000. This is a great achievement and to be celebrated, but we still have the balance on the bigger loan of £20,000 to repay in due course.

Of course, we are thinking here of monetary loans and debts, which can often cause serious problems for many people. But even bigger problems are caused by the many ways that we get things wrong and mess up in our lives – often through the breakdown of relationships and by putting ourselves first, digging ourselves an even bigger hole which becomes even more difficult to get out of!

But this is where Jesus and Easter come in! God could see that He needed some drastic action to provide a way for his people on earth to come back into a loving relationship with Him. Jesus was the answer, dying for our sins on the cross and doing away with the huge debt that we owe and rising again in glory to overcome death and our debt. **Yes, the price is paid!**

So, as we come to Easter let's celebrate God's great victory over sin and death and the birth of new life, hope and love through all that Jesus has done for us.

Morning worship at Cornerstone starts at 10.30 am every Sunday and all are welcome.


Services are also streamed live via our YouTube channel https://bit.ly/CornerstoneHytheURC and the recording of the service will be available on YouTube afterwards.


After the service, **Coffee and Tea** will be served in the main hall where people enjoy fellowship together.





A Message for Lent 2025

Dear friends,

As we enter this Lenten season, we find ourselves in a world filled with challenges. The on-going humanitarian crises in Gaza and Ukraine, the increasingly visible effects of climate change, and the divisive political rhetoric that surrounds us can leave us feeling overwhelmed and powerless. Yet it is precisely in such times that the meaning of Lent becomes most powerful. When Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, he faced not just external temptations but profound questions about his identity and purpose. His forty days of struggle weren't about proving his willpower - they were about clarifying who he was called to be in a broken world.

Perhaps our greatest temptation today is not chocolate, social media, or other small indulgences we might give up for Lent. Perhaps our greatest temptation is to turn away from the difficult truths about ourselves and our world, to sleepwalk through life rather than to engage with it fully and courageously.

When we look away from the suffering in Gaza or Ukraine, when we ignore the realities of climate change, when we dismiss those whose politics differ from ours, we're not just avoiding uncomfortable topics, we're avoiding the deeper work God calls us to do: the work of becoming more fully ourselves and more fully present in God's world.

Fortunately, there is good news: the same Spirit that Luke tells us led Jesus into the wilderness remains with us today. The same Spirit that the writer of Genesis tells us hovered over the waters of creation continues to move through the chaos of our lives and our world, bringing forth new possibilities, new understanding, and new life.

This Lent is a good time to ask ourselves what are we running from today? What truth are we afraid to face? Where might the Spirit be leading us to grow? As you reflect, remember that we don't face our wilderness alone. We journey together as Christ's body, supporting one another with compassion and hope; and we journey with the Spirit, who knows that our struggles are not about proving ourselves good or bad, but about discovering who we are truly called to be.

May this Lenten season be for each of us a time of honest reflection and renewed commitment. May we find the courage to face difficult truths about ourselves and our world. And may we emerge from these forty days more fully alive, more deeply connected, and more ready to be bearers of God's love and justice in a world that so desperately needs them.



Nick wrote the script for us (thank you Wendy for making sure he finished it on time). I hope you will agree that it is very light hearted yet still carries a very strong message. Whilst Nick has

made it possible for Naomi and Bobby to use scripts, I am hoping that they don't need to. It is so much easier organising the rehearsals with the smaller group and this time we have also rehearsed straight after our Sunday service. I am also pleased that Ray has very kindly volunteered to help with our rehearsals. It makes a huge difference having his input and perspective on things, particularly with Bobby who I think has got a little annoyed with being directed by his Mum all the time.

Normally at this point, I would ramble on a little about my inspiration for the drama, however this month I can't do that as I didn't write it! I don't think it would be fair to ask Nick to write the article as well as the script so you are stuck with me! The play focuses on our sins and how despite making numerous mistakes, God still loves and forgives us. As I write this, we are heading towards the end of Lent which is a time for us to reflect on our own lives, both our thoughts and our actions. I have been reading the Book of Psalms this month. Well I use the word

reading very loosely as I have actually been listening to them. I was finding it very hard to connect with the words so I found an app which means I can listen to a recording of them whilst reading them. On reflection, maybe this was their purpose as they were originally written as songs. Apologies, I digress. This morning, Psalms 62 really struck me as this was the first one which I felt was not focused on asking God for protection during conflicts, so I did a bit of research. It is attributed to David and was possibly written during the turmoil with his son Absalom which may explain the depth of feelings expressed in it. How difficult that must have been for him, knowing that the son he loved was planning to harm him. David lived knowing what his son Absalom was

capable of. Absalom orchestrated the murder of his half brother Amnon to avenge the rape of his sister. After fleeing, he was allowed to return. He staged a



Reading the books of Samuel and Psalms has been really eye opening for me as I have been able to see David's growth through the challenges life threw at him. Knowing the context of when the song was written has helped me to better understand the message. David does not ask God for anything, instead he pours out his heart and expresses his great faith and confidence in Him. Imagine how hard that would be to cope with, bearing in mind, back in those days it was quite normal to fight and kill people. There is a true feeling of how much David is trusting God with everything which I know for me can be very hard at times



Easter is deeply connected with the concept of forgiveness, both asking God to forgive our sins and also forgiving others. David asked for God's forgiveness many times, as written in Psalm 51, so it is something which God clearly

wants us to hold in our hearts and work on. We know that David was heard because he fought and won many battles including those within his family. Are you willing to truly ask God to forgive you for all your wrongs both large and small? I will leave you to ponder on that thought.

YOUTH BIBLE GROUP

For the final question 'how should we use what we have?', we decided that the best thing to do with our money and possessions is donate to a reliable charity. To end our discussion we talked about what we should or shouldn't do with ourselves. For our ears we mustn't listen to gossip, for our mouth we should think before we speak and spread the Gospel rather than gossip and for our hands we must give not take and do not fight. Finally, I mentioned that in my opinion, my life would be just as good without free will, because nothing would ever be my fault or my responsibility and I could just do what I'm told, nothing more and nothing less.

The second episode of our general meetings and discussion was on the topic of wisdom. However, before we began we had to give Angela a small present as she is moving house so this would be her last Bible Study with us for a tragically long time. We were asked what wisdom is and gave many answers including:

- Philosophy and morals
- It comes with age (with an exception in the case of Bev Hall)
- It comes from God
- It helps us make life choices

BEN CARTER'S JAZZ - AN UPDATE

In April 2024, we shared the exciting news about Ben Carter, a talented local jazz saxophonist, who had launched a crowdfunding campaign to record his debut album. Now, we're thrilled to report that Ben's album *Pulsar* was released in the summer of 2024 to glowing reviews and has even been featured on Jazz FM!

Ben, who grew up in Hythe and was one of Kirsty Newbury's piano students, began his musical career playing with local youth jazz groups, such as the Romsey Area Youth Jazz Orchestra and

Southampton Youth Jazz Órchestra, before studying at the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire. At just 23, Ben's dedication to jazz and his original compositions culminated in the creation of his first album *Pulsar* - a title inspired by the rhythmic pulses of collapsing stars.

Since its release, *Pulsar* has made waves in the jazz community, with a track from the album even receiving airplay on Jazz FM. Ben's goal remains clear: "My main goal is for as many people as possible to listen to my music and hopefully enjoy it."

Beyond the album, Ben continues to perform with his band, the Ben Carter Quintet, and is also part of a new group, *Impossible Conversations*, which blends funk and modern jazz. With upcoming gigs in cities like Birmingham, Manchester, Nottingham, and Cambridge, this group is receiving high praise. A recent jazz critic described their performance as "exceptional" and compared them to the Ezra Collective, a band that went on to win the Mercury Music Prize.

Locally, Ben also recently joined Kirsty to perform at the Honeypot Children's Charity Christmas Carol Concert in Romsey Abbey, where they helped raise over £10,000 for young carers.

We're excited to see where Ben's musical journey takes him next and look forward to hearing more from both *Pulsar* and *Impossible Conversations* in the months ahead.
