

# Letter from the Elders

Dear Friends,



As Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt, they faced an insurmountable obstacle - the sea before them and Pharaoh's army behind them. In this moment, God instructed Moses: "Lift up your staff...and divide the water". Moses obeyed, leading to an astonishing miracle where "the waters were divided" (Exodus 14 v 16). This allowed over two million Israelites to walk across dry ground safely.

When Jesus learns that Lazarus is ill, He delays His visit. By the time He arrives, Lazarus has been dead for four days. Despite this apparent hopelessness, **Jesus calls Lazarus out of the tomb (John 11)**. Miraculously, he emerges alive.

Just two examples from the Old and New Testament where God shows his amazing power. In the first it's over an element from his creation, and the other actually over death itself. Amazing, and there are countless other examples of God showing his incredible and limitless power that I could have quoted. So I ask you a very simple question-**"DO WE WORSHIP THIS SAME ALL POWERFUL GOD?"** 

**"Of course we do"** I hear you cry. The God we worship through his Son Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever. Hebrews 13 v 8 even tells us that. So I ask you perhaps an even more difficult question. "When you pray and ask God to intervene, to do something amazing or seemingly impossible, do you really believe it will actually happen? Certainly, Moses and Jesus did from the two examples quoted in the first two paragraphs.

Or just maybe we surround our prayers and supplications in some fuzzy words such "In your time O Lord", "According to Your will O God" and even "Lord if it is part of your plan". On the one hand this is perhaps absolutely correct because it recognises our lack of understanding of what God can and will do. However, on the other hand are we fudging our request and giving ourselves a bit of a "safety valve" to prevent us from feeling disappointed if we don't get the answer we want.

When the prophets of the Old Testament prayed, and when Jesus

asked for Lazarus to rise from the dead the answers were instant and dramatic as they needed to be. Which leaves me with perhaps the most challenging thing that Jesus said in his ministry as recorded in Matthew 17 v 20: **"Truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain: 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you"** 

Jesus tells us very clearly that we should expect the miraculous from God. We should expect him to intervene in the most amazing and incredible ways. We worship a God of the possible, not the impossible, and we shouldn't try and shackle him by inserting words that reflect our own limited understanding and indeed perhaps lack of total faith in what God can do.

We do worship a powerful and almighty God who has demonstrated his love for us over and over again, not least through his Son, Jesus. So let's pray with confidence, let's seek his wisdom and guidance. We want to see the power of God unleashed on lives that are wrecked and a very troubled and broken World. We may not actually move a mountain but I'd settle for the occasional molehill every now and then.

#### YOUTH BIBLE GROUP



Hello, it's me, Bobby, again, here to talk about our Youth Bible Study. We have only had one session since you were last updated by Grace and that session was on Friday 13<sup>th</sup> of June.

For a very long time we had been trying to get Kevin Thatcher to come and answer all of our many questions with his incredible and profound wisdom and on Friday, we finally did so. We began the discussions with the beginning of it all, Genesis 1 v 1. We made our way to the end of chapter 1 with plenty of stops for discussion in between. One of these discussions was my question which was if Jesus was present in some form when the whole thing started, and if so, what form did he take? I was told that he probably was there but not as meat and bone until 0BC. This time we were told that there are three mythical animals in the Bible and we had to write the three we thought. My team won, of course, because we got one of our three correct, dragon. Kevin then told us that the only three mythical creatures mentioned in the Bible were leviathan, dragon and behemoth.

After that, we did more talking and I asked Kevin about parallel universes and if there was no God in a different universe. He gave a long and intelligent response including an explanation of Shrödinger's cat and it must be said that despite my attempt to keep up with the intellectual speech he made, I was, along with everybody else I believe, somewhat baffled. We then prayed about all sorts and went our own ways.

#### PRAYER POINTERS FOR JULY

#### Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> to Saturday 5<sup>th</sup>

- Lord we remember all the families who lost a loved one in the Air India plane crash. We ask that they will be comforted. We pray answers will be found as to the cause and we thank you that extra checks are now being put in place for added safety. We also pray for everyone who has a real fear of travel, either by water, rail, roads or flight.
- Lord, conflicts in the Middle East are causing problems with shipping. So many businesses here in the UK rely on imported goods, we ask Lord for safety for these vessels. We also ask for common sense Lord as to the tariffs countries impose on imported or exported goods that are reflected in our cost of living.
- We remember also Lord our custom and excise officers. We pray for their safety and that of the animals they work with and we also ask that much contraband will be discovered and the people who import harmful substances will be caught.

#### Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> to Saturday 12<sup>th</sup>

- Today Lord we lift up everyone who is involved with SASRA (The Soldiers' and Airmen's Scripture Readers Association) We thank you for their courage as they work and minister to our men and women in the armed forces wherever they are stationed. Please help and enable all military charities that offer help with housing, caring for the wounded, mentally or physically and also help our veterans to adapt to civilian life.
- We thank you for the many activities that are available within our communities that help us to get out and about and make friends. We also remember those who live by themselves, and are unable to go out. Help them Lord not to feel lonely. We ask that the befriending services of the Red Cross will have the resources they need, both human and financial so that no one who asks for their help will be denied.

#### Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> to Saturday 19<sup>th</sup>

- As we come to worship You today Lord we ask that all church and open air services will be blessed. We pray that there will be many coming to know You for the first time as Your Holy Spirit floods our land.
- Lord we ask that You will bring peace once again to the Middle East, especially between Israel and Iran, Israel and Gaza and also Lord the war between Russia and Ukraine. Lord may all who have lost loved ones in these conflicts know Your comfort. We pray for all who have been wounded mentally or physically. May they know Your healing Lord. We also pray for all who have lost their homes through these conflicts and ask that they will find shelter.

#### Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> to Saturday 26<sup>th</sup>

- Lord we ask that You will be with and help our Bible Society workers as they give out bibles within refugee camps, many in the receiver's own language. We thank you also for their witness in explaining the Gospel of the Good News of Jesus to both believer's and non-believers in these camps. We pray for Your protection for Your people in these camps as they share Your words of salvation with those around them. Both Africa and Asia are mainly Muslim people, and some hold very extremist views, we ask that Your Holy Spirit will flow through these camps and bring Your peace to reign.
- For all in these refugee camps; please help them retain their self-dignity and worth, please grant them hope and please help their situations to improve. We pray for all the aid agencies who work in these camps. Thank you for the gifts of food, water, shelter, clothing and medicine that is distributed to so many. Please continue to hold up the medical teams that work tirelessly to bring relief, from general healthcare, midwifery and emergency operations.

#### Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> to Thursday 31<sup>st</sup>

- Lord we pray for all our church services, many will be on holiday, so we ask Lord that all visitors will be made welcome. And again Lord, may all hear the messages that you are sending us, either through the worship or the spoken word, and Lord may many new friendships be made.
- We pray too for all our emergency services. Now that the school holidays have started, its known that lots of children get into various scrapes as they seek to explore and enjoy new areas and experiences, especially climbing.
- We also pray for parents as they do their best to arrange childcare as they have to work. Lord, for families that can't afford a day out or are even unable to provide regular meals, we thank you for all the holiday clubs that are either free or reasonably priced that also provide a free meal. So Lord as families embrace the summer holiday, we ask that you will enable them to spend time together and enjoy lots of fun and laughter.

#### PRAYER POINTERS FOR AUGUST

#### Friday 1<sup>st</sup> to Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup>

 Lord we pray for the University graduates that are taking a year out to travel. We ask that not only will their adventure help them to grow in wisdom, understanding and compassion; but they would also be kept safe. Help them make a difference to the charities they engage with as they help with local projects around the world.

#### Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> to Saturday 9<sup>th</sup>

• We pray for the work of Beach Missions around our coastland. We ask that You will be with all those taking part, please Lord help the younger members of the teams as they seek to share the love of Jesus with people they meet. We ask also Lord that they will witness many coming to faith through their efforts.

- Lord, it is not a holiday for everyone; for graduates and school leavers they may be struggling to find work, so we ask that there will be many job fairs to help them find the kind of job they are looking for. We ask that many local firms will be able to offer apprenticeships that will offer a real skill.
- We pray also for those who cannot work due to illness or disability, again please grant them a creative heart and enable them to find something they can enjoy doing.
- We pray for our armed services as they take on lots of new recruits. We ask that new welfare measures will have been put in place to safeguard the young men and women, especially those who are away from home for the first time. For those in the Navy we ask that You will keep them safe as they patrol our waterways and go on exercises abroad.

#### Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> to Saturday 16<sup>th</sup>

- We give You thanks for Your creation Lord: Its beauty and complexity not only feeds our bodies but our souls as well. Who can fail to praise you Lord when we see such wondrous sights, like sunrise and sunsets, or hear the rustle of leaves on a tree or the trill of a songbird. Thank you Lord that You speak to us in these moments; as You lead us beside still waters in our soul.
- We ask Lord there will be more protected areas in our oceans, especially where new undersea grasses and kelp is being planted, and the coral reefs. Help us in keeping our rivers and streams free of pollutants from nearby businesses and sewage spills and leakage. We pray for all endeavours that will help clear our waterways of rubbish and debris. And please grant that we all would have a care about our local green spaces up and down the country.
- We pray for our local council, please grant them the wisdom they need as they prioritise council services. Thank you that they too are doing the best they can with limited finances and resources in the battle against climate change.

#### Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> to Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup>

- Today Lord we thank you for everyone who operates our sound desk; and the ability to stream our services across the internet. We pray for everyone who accesses our services online. Lord, we ask that You will meet with them, and for those who don't know You yet, may they come and accept the salvation Jesus offers.
- In our daily lives we are becoming more dependant on the use of computer's, robots, etc., for work, leisure, security, and medical diagnoses and procedures. Thank you for all this progress; but we ask Lord for safeguards to be put in place. We ask that You will enable the interception of any cyber attacks against our government, businesses, emergency services, or private devices. We also ask that age verification will be required online to protect our children and young people from harmful contents. We ask also Lord that these systems will not easily be overcome.

#### Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> to Saturday 30<sup>th</sup>

- Thank you Lord for all who work hard to prepare your places of worship; the cleaners, tea and coffee providers, flowers and all who welcome and assist us. Bless each one and again open our hearts and minds to the messages you have for us. Grant our speakers understanding of your word, and help them in their preparations. Grant them boldness and passion as they bring Your message to us.
- On Bank holiday Monday we ask for your traveling mercies as people are out and about visiting new and favourite destinations. As this can cause a lot of heavy road and rail travel, we ask that You be with our emergency services as they try to get through this heavy traffic.
- This week Lord our young people get their exam results. May they be pleasantly surprised with their grades. May none be disappointed.

 We also remember our farmers, most will be up early till last light. We pray their crops will be plentiful and of a good quality despite a poor start. We also ask that they will be able to hire the equipment they need, and the resources to both harvest and store the crops. Lord may they receive a fair price for their produce so they wont be worse off and consider giving up. We also ask Lord that there will be more opportunities for farmers to get together so they don't feel so isolated.

#### **BOOK REVIEW**



The Works of the Lord is a collection of 52 biblical reflections on creation, science and technology. Each contributor is a scientist and/ or a theologian, who uses the insights from their scientific studies to inform their faith and worship within a biblical context. The reflection

begins with a passage of scripture and it ends with a short prayer. The book isn't a scientific, philosophical or theological treatise. It seeks to encourage us to experience how science can help to deepen our understanding of God revealed in creation.

**Coming to Faith Through Dawkins** contains 12 essays on the pathway from New Atheism to Christianity, edited by Denis Alexander and Alister Mcgrath. The contributors come from a wide range of backgrounds and cultures, who became disillusioned by the arguments and conclusions of Richard Dawkins. Inevitably extracts from science, philosophy and theology are mentioned in the book, and the comments are well referenced. It is not a 12 plan for converting your atheist friend. The inspiration lies in following each person's journey to faith in Christ.

very proud of how well Grace took on her role as maid. Whilst she only had a few lines, I felt she was able to bring them to life and her presence on stage has definitely grown. Not surprising really as she is part of an amateur dramatic group outside of Drama Llamas.



You may have noticed that we actually did a little more than our drama and ended up leading the whole service. My initial intention was to work alongside Nick to get a feel for how to run a service. However one thing led to another and we ended up taking over completely. Notice the use of the word 'we' as it most definitely was a team effort. I had been struggling to come up with any idea for the service and stumbled upon the fact that it was Trinity Sunday for the Catholic church so initially our plan was to base it on that. However, for some reason we ended up focusing on the Holy Spirit. Possibly because it is the one element of the triad which I struggle with most. I looked up random facts about the Holy Spirit which is how we came up with the idea for the game for our introduction. Bobby and Liam led it very well, at least it looked like everyone was enjoying it from where I was sat. Who would have thought 'Play Your Cards Right' could be used for a church service. Nick then brought it all into context with the theme for our service whilst also sharing about his relationship and understanding of the Holy Spirit.

Our prayers, which were beautifully written and lead by Liam, worked perfectly for me, helping me to appreciate the awesome presence of the Holy Spirit. Ric brought the whole service together with a wonderful

summary at the end. I know that there is no way we could have put this all together on our own, so am pretty sure that God had a hand in it. I will not bore you with too many details, however I will just say this. When we were working on the plan for the service, we had no idea what bible readings to use. One day I came up with the idea of using the first and last reference in the Bible of the Holy Spirit as readings



to book-end the sermon section of the service. Later on I found out that Ric had had exactly the same thought and was surprised when he saw the order of service including them. Working on this service has really developed my relationship with the Holy Trinity. Whereas before I always felt a connection with God the Father, now I am sensing the Holy Spirit around me more often. I used to think that the Holy Spirit only stepped in at times of great need such as illness or threat. Now I realise that the Holy Spirit is around me all the time, sometimes gently guiding me as with the service and other times bashing me over the head to get my attention. Maybe I would have less headaches if I started to tune in to the gentle guidance of God.

You may have noticed that I was slightly nervous at the start of our service. In my previous life I would have thought nothing about standing up in front of a large group of strangers to share my knowledge as a specialist dementia nurse so why was I so phased by leading the service? Even Bobby had to remind me to slow down after I stumbled through the welcome. I had not realised what a big deal leading the service would be as all of a sudden I was responsible for carrying God's word. During the first song, I looked out and saw all my church friends, smiling and singing with me. All of a sudden I realised I was not on my own so I took a deep breath, allowed God in and enjoyed the rest of the service.


