

THE GLOBAL WEEK OF PRAYER 1st - 7th SEPTEMBER 2025

This September from 1st to 7th is the Global Week of 24-7 Prayer and the vision

is simple but powerful: to see non-stop prayer in every nation on earth, lifting up the name of Jesus and asking God to move across the world. Many churches and groups across the nations have already signed up, which is amazing. The Waterside House of Prayer will be providing a space and resources to enable us to gather and pray from churches across the Waterside, this will be based at Lighthouse Community Church in Hardley. Full details of times can be found below. Local churches and intercessors are being invited to participate.

Why one week?

Prayer is happening all the time, all over the world: so why this invitation to a Global Week of Prayer? In short, this is a moment of profound unity as the global Church stands together. When we pray, we discover God's heart for transformation in our towns, in our cities, in our nations. What could happen if there was a week of non-stop prayer in every nation on earth? How might God encounter us? How might his greatness be seen? How might we see transformation?

What are the Waterside House of Prayer (WHOP) doing?

Monday to Saturday there will be a number of prayer stations set up for individuals or small groups to use to encourage prayer for particular areas of need. These will be available as drop-in sessions during the following times daily:

8.00am to 10.00am; 1.00pm to 3.00pm; 7.00pm to 9.00pm Members of the Waterside House of Prayer will be available during these times to provide assistance and guidance if needed.

On Sunday, each church is encouraged to pray for the nations during their services and Sunday evening to attend St. Andrews 'Refuelled' service at 6.30pm for a time of corporate prayer and worship.

This Global week of Prayer is a great opportunity to collaborate and partner with other churches in the Waterside area to cry out for the healing of our nations.

Who is 24/7 Prayer?

24-7 Prayer is an international, interdenominational prayer movement with a vision to revive the church and rewire the culture through nonstop night and day prayer.

They started in 1999, when a simple student-led prayer vigil went viral and groups all over the world joined in to pray. Now, over two decades later, thousands of communities have taken part in 24-7 Prayer in churches, communities and cities in over half the countries on earth.

A MESSAGE FOR SEPTEMBER 2025

from: Michael Hopkins, Wessex Synod Moderator

Dear friends, September has always felt more like the true beginning of the year to me than January ever does. In church life we walk our

way through the life of Jesus from Advent to Pentecost, and now we begin the cycle again by turning to creation. Scripture begins with God's delight in creation: "God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good" (Genesis 1:31). The earth is not ours to use up, but God's gift in which we share, entrusted to our care as part of creation. When the land suffers, as it has this summer, we are reminded of Paul's words: "The whole creation has been groaning in labour pains until now" (Romans 8:22). This Season of Creation is a time for us to join our prayers with creation's groaning, and to renew our calling, as fellow creatures, to "serve and keep" the earth (Genesis 2:15), caring for the web of life of which we are a part.

September is also the beginning of the academic year. When we learn, teach, and seek understanding we are honouring God. Jesus himself was called "Teacher", and now is a good time to give thanks for all who teach, guide, and encourage the young. Even if your church has no young people, this is still a good time to pray for students and staff.

This year, in particular, we are living through a time of heightened tension about immigration. Again and again, Scripture calls God's people to remember their own history: "You shall love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt" (Deuteronomy 10:19). "When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19:33–34). Abraham and Sarah set out in faith towards a new home (Genesis 12:1), Israel knew exile and return, and Jesus himself was once a refugee in Egypt (Matthew 2:14–15). The church is most truly the church when it embodies this welcome. I especially want to reassure all Ministers, Elders, and members who have come to the UK from around the world that you are not only welcome among us, but that we treasure the insights and experiences you bring to enrich us.

In all these things we hold fast to the unshakable promise: "Nothing in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:39). With my thanks for all that you do for God's work through the United Reformed Church, and with prayers for every local church and minister.

DRAMA LLAMAS



Hello everyone, I hope you have all enjoyed your summer and are making the most of the glorious weather. I have been enjoying it immensely especially now we have Woody, our dog, as he gives me the incentive to go exploring every day. On our expeditions it has

been really interesting seeing how plants grow, adapting to their surroundings and of course the weather. My apple tree is the perfect example. We planted it a good few years ago and as expected, the first year it bore no fruit. The next year we had a couple of apples and last year I think it had half a dozen rather small yet still delicious apples. This year, we have had a bumper crop with literally bags of them which I think is very similar to what has been happening with Drama

I am writing this the day after our latest production which was part of our All Age service and think it is fair to say that it was a great success. I am delighted to take very little credit for the drama as it was written and directed by Naomi with Ray working alongside her. I literally only needed to supervise the final rehearsal as we had to ensure there were two adults present. Ray has been helping Bobby and Grace with their voice projection and also encouraging them to learn their lines which they both did perfectly. They both really brought their characters to life,



portraying Joseph and the angel really well. A very different performance to our first Drama Llama sketch where we were all reading from our scripts and not really getting into character at all. For quite a long time I would base the characters on ourselves to make it that much easier, so quite often I would be the mum! I do think that Grace is a little angel so her role was perfect for her.

Now usually I would explain to you how the drama came about as I would have written it, but as this is not the case this time, I will explain a little more about the current series of topics we are using for our All Age services instead. When I wrote my last article, I had no idea what would be happening with the All Age services other than I had volunteered to lead a couple more, the first of which was our baptism service in July. I truly hope that those of you who were able to join us enjoyed it as much

as I did. How lucky we were to have witnessed not one, not two but three people put their faith in Christ. Even writing this brings tears to my eyes as it was such a magical time. It was a delight hearing each one of them share their story in their own individual way. I think it will remain in my heart as one of my most memorable experiences. On a slightly different note, having the baptisms made it easier for me to lead the service as they quite rightly took up most of the time. It also gave me the inspiration for our current series which we have entitled 'Jesus Christ: The Prequel' as John the Baptist was a key player in Jesus' journey. I would love to have heard him preach as I can't imagine how powerful his words would have been. People were seeking him out to hear his message and don't forget, that was in the days before internet and social media so people would only have heard about him by word of mouth.



Our August service focused on Joseph, Jesus' earthly father. I found it quite hard to research Joseph as there is very little information about him in the Bible. I was delighted that as well as Naomi bringing his story to life with our drama, her Dad, Kevin was able to share his understanding of Joseph's role. Joseph could almost be seen as having a 'bit-part' in Jesus' life, yet without him, things may have been very

different for both Mary and Jesus. What he did, which was to marry Mary knowing she was pregnant and not carrying his child, and then acknowledge Jesus as his own child, was a huge demonstration of his faith. It has helped me to truly trust God on a much deeper level. Leading the All Age services is a perfect example of this.

As you know, I live with health issues which at times can leave me really tired to the point in which I can hardly string a sentence together. I had planned the service meticulously and had written a script which I read from for most of the time so that I did not need to worry about finding the right words. My only concern was that I was not able to write up the final summary as we were having an 'Open Mic' section where we encouraged everyone to share their thoughts and inspirations from the service. This was not something that I could script or plan in advance as I did not know what would be said. I had also been very careful with the timings to ensure that we had enough content without going on for too long so as to ensure that

the really young people didn't get bored. I did check my watch at one point and thought that we were going through everything a little quicker than planned and the service may have ended too early. However God had His own plan. The 'Open Mic' section worked perfectly finishing at exactly the right time and also completely negated the need for me to do any more than a very brief summary.

At the time of writing this, all I know about our next Drama Llama sketch is that it will be performed in October. We may continue our "Jesus Christ: The Prequel" as this would be perfect timing for Christmas. For the time being I am focusing on our next All Age service which will be Harvest Festival so a wonderful opportunity to look at how we can 'harvest' nowadays when very few of us actually grow crops. I am laying down a challenge for you to all think if there is someone or a team within our church that you would like to thank for all they do, especially those behind the scenes who often are overlooked.

So on that note, I will leave you with your homework and in God's hands.

How to study the Bible -A meaningful and effective guide

I am amazed at the generosity of God and at the generosity of those of you who support the work. Under the hand of God, you have together helped so many people. Let me explain what you have achieved in Nepal alone.

With your generosity we have either fully or partially funded the building of 27 small churches. We are now on the third two-year training programme for rural pastors and leaders making 74 students who will have been trained and received a small set of books. In addition, we have supported several three-day pastors' training sessions in regions few foreigners visit.


We have funded the building of a number of simple houses for the very poor. We have funded the medical expenses of several, from a child who fell off a roof needing hospital treatment to adults like pastor Sagar knocked off his motor bike and needing an operation to amputate his leg, and a young lady called Leela Mukhiya needing a heart operation.

Many, many families have received bags of rice when hungry or blankets when cold. We have funded water projects in isolated villages, bought goats for a poor family and a cow for another.

But most importantly you have enabled thousands in Nepal to hear the gospel.

Just this week I have received a photo of the book that you enabled us to fund to be written and printed. The full title of the book: "How to study the Bible - a meaningful and effective guide", was written by Tika Ram Baral for rural pastors. We have printed 1,000 copies. The next book Tika is planning to write for the pastors is "What does the Bible actually teach"

I thank all of you for your amazing support.
