NOVEMBER CHURCH MEETING


Sunday 23rd November

UNITED REFORMED CHURCH WESSEX SYNOD

REPORT of SYNOD MEETING on
OCTOBER 11TH 2025

What have these three things in common?

WHERE IS NICAEA? WHERE IS GALACIA? SONGS of PRAISE (SUNDAY 19TH OCTOBER)

NICAEA is in present day North West Turkey. **GALACIA** is in present day North Central Turkey while **SONGS OF PRAISE** transmitted a programme about the “Creed of Nicaea”.

At the Wessex Synod meeting the Revd Dr Susan Durbur, our guest speaker, spoke of attending a meeting to review the Nicene Creed. The Creed was first agreed around 325 AD – 1700 years ago - and was necessary to ensure there was a common understanding of the Christian Faith, necessary because there was a considerable amount of untrue and false teaching taking place.

The following day Kay Keen spoke to us about the differences of opinion between the leaders of the church that Paul had established in Galacia. It seems there were still many different thoughts and understandings some 300 years after Paul wrote to the church in Galatia, of what the Christian Church believed. In both messages we are encouraged to know and understand what we believe.

A week later Songs of Praise ran the programme centred on the Creed – a well worth-while watch.

We are often encouraged to share our Faith, but how essential it is to know and understand clearly what it is we believe. Check out the Nicaean Creed from the copies in the FOYER.

Further Synod News:-

- ◆ 7 pastorates are seeking Ministers of Word & Sacrament, including Hythe & Southbourne.

- ◆ There were 14 Resolutions brought, discussed and approved – some with minor amendments, among them - Approval of the Resolution “Endorses the pioneer ministry at Welborne Garden Village as the Synod’s bid for its pioneering post to intentionally grow a new Christian community there”. (Welborne is just north of Fareham)
- ◆ Approval of the Resolution “Wessex Synod approves a grant of up to £140,000 from the General Fund of the Wessex Trust to support the URC’s Inter-Synod Resource Sharing for 2026”.

PRAYER POINTERS FOR NOVEMBER

We start the month with All Saints Day on November 1st. We give thanks for all the heroes of the faith who have handed down to us the gospel message. Many of them died for their faith. We pray for those who even today, are being persecuted for their faith. Lord give them the courage and grace they need to stand firm. We give thanks for the freedom we have in this country to worship freely and share our faith with others. May we make the most of every opportunity.

Hebrews 12 v 1 Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us.

On Sunday 2nd November we have a baptism at Church. We rejoice with those who are taking this step of faith and we pray a blessing on them.

As we see the proliferation of poppies in our community we pray for the Royal British Legion. We thank you for their care of veterans and their families. We pray that this year's poppy appeal will bring in the resources they need. Remembrance Day was instituted after the first world war in 1919. We give thanks for our armed services and their willingness to risk their lives to protect our country.

John 15 v13 Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends

We pray for families who have lost loved ones who died while serving our country – may they be comforted in their loss and know that we all appreciate the sacrifice that their loved ones made.

We pray for veterans who have returned from service with wounds and disabilities. Some of these disabilities like PTSD are not always visible and can have far reaching consequences.

May there be help, support and encouragement to enable them to return to a fulfilled civilian life.

We pray for other charities and organizations who work to support veterans and military families. May there be sufficient help and volunteers to meet their needs.

We pray that all the services, parades and acts of remembrance that will be taking place at this time will occur safely and without any opposition or demonstrations.

We do pray about the rise in demonstrations and the more aggressive behaviour that is occurring currently. We give thanks that we are a country where free speech has been welcomed in the past and we pray that we will not become a polarized society.

The war in Gaza has been one issue that triggered such demonstrations. As I write, the ceasefire is off to a shaky start and we pray that it will hold and in fact lead to peace.

We give thanks that the hostages have been released and we pray that the remains of those who died in captivity will be returned.

We pray for the returning population of Gaza who have been displaced many times. We pray for strength and safety for them as they return and for courage and resilience as they face the devastation of their former homes.

We thank You that aid is once again flowing into the country – may the shipments and trucks of aid reach the areas where they are needed. We pray that in the short term there will be enough food, water, shelter and medical supplies to meet their immediate needs.

In the longer term we pray that effective government will be established and that plans for rebuilding and education etc. will be developed. We pray that the resources for these projects will be forthcoming.

Lord we pray that peace will come to Ukraine. We pray that the increased sanctions by President Trump and pressure on President Putin will lead to a ceasefire. We pray for a just settlement for Ukraine.

In both these conflicts we know that children have suffered greatly. We bring these children to You Lord and ask that you have compassion and somehow mitigate the experiences they have endured.

In our country we pray for our health service. We all know that it is under pressure and lacking staff and resources. We pray for effective management of the service so that waiting times can be reduced and resources used to their full extent. We particularly pray for the mental health provision both in the adult and youth services. We long to see fulfilled and abundant lives in every area of our community.

We hear that there is a quiet revival going on particularly with Generation Z and particularly with young men. Lord we thank You that You are pouring Your Spirit out

Joel 2 v 28 I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your old men will dream dreams, your young men will see visions. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days.

We pray that we will see revival here in our community

*Come, set our hearts ablaze with hope,
Like wildfire in our very souls,
Holy Spirit come invade us now.
We are Your church,
We need Your power in us.*

IS MY GIFT GOOD ENOUGH?

Fund raising is always difficult for us, Nick for the church and myself for Families Matter. We obviously can't suggest an amount someone might give, but you may wonder what would be appropriate, particularly as the costs are usually shown in thousands. Now, a few days ago, I met a lady who has just started supporting Families Matter with a monthly gift and I thanked her. She then said, 'I have worried for a number of months, thinking my gift will not make a difference, it is less than a pound a day'. And she was correct, her £25/month is less than a £1 a day. However, that is not how we see it. £25/month is £300/year and if you can Gift Aid it, it becomes £375/year.

Now Laura Gray, our manager, can spend three or four hours completing a ten-page bid for that amount and we cannot guarantee that it will be successful. So, you see, this gift is important to us and if there were a lot of people giving, then it becomes very important to us. So, remember no gift is too small. Also, pray about it, it's all about prayerful giving and answering God's call on your life. Jesus has made everything possible, He is faithful.

DRAMA LLAMAS

Dear friends, hello and welcome to Autumn, I am writing this to you the day after our last All Age (A²) service which I hope you enjoyed as much as I did. Let's start with the opening of the service which as you would have noticed was done by Bobby. I can't tell you how proud a mum I am to watch my son open a service, being so confident and at ease whilst up there. I had planned for Bobby to do a different part of the service, however he was adamant that he was not going to do what his mother told him and chose to do something completely different i.e. the opening. Bobby has also become part of our little planning team, so for all future services will be actively involved in everything that goes on behind the scenes.

As part of the introduction, Ray questioned Wendy about the Catholic concept of Mary which I found really interesting. I hadn't realised how revered the Virgin Mary is within the Catholic faith although understandable when you think that a miracle happened inside her when she became Jesus' mother.

Ray gave a wonderful explanation of the Magnificat explaining each of the different lines of the song which was really thought provoking. I found the passage of Luke's Gospel powerful, so powerful that it was banned from public recitation in Guatemala in the 80s as it was felt to be too dangerous and revolutionary. Her words are a song of salvation, with political, economic, and social dimensions that cannot be blunted. I understand why the Catholic church venerate Mary, as God accomplished so much through her.



Grace shared a powerful poem she had written about her relationship with God. Before the service, she showed it to me for the first time and I found it so moving. She was able to eloquently express her innermost worries and strength she gets from the connection she has with our Father. Understandably before reading it she was quite nervous as this was opening herself up completely in front of the whole church family which I know was a massive deal. So needless to say I am immensely proud of Grace and delighted that her poem has been included in this newsletter on page 27.



We had a couple of bible readings. The first was intended to be a monologue performed by Naomi but unfortunately it did not work out. This was my fault as I hadn't organised things well enough. We had a second unofficial reading (John 2 v 1-12) which is about the first recorded time Jesus performed a miracle. In particular the fact that Mary, his mother pushed him to do it. I wonder how she felt about it all, as she must have known that his future would be challenging. She may have felt as mothers feel nowadays when their children are leaving to go to university. You know it's the right thing for them yet you're deeply sad that they are leaving home. You realize that they are no longer your little baby as they've grown into adults. After all Jesus, the man that performed this miracle was the same Jesus that Mary had held in her arms after giving birth to him in a stable.

Next we had the magic trick which Bobby didn't want to do so it was down to me to do it. If I'm honest, I quite enjoyed doing it as I could just be me. I didn't have to remember any words, it was a really simple thing to do and just a bit of fun. Bev then came in and told us that we had no water, therefore we wouldn't be able to serve tea and coffee after the service. The idea was that I wanted everybody to feel how the servants had felt at the feast when they ran out of wine. I'm not sure whether or not this worked although I know it did it cause an awful lot of confusion.

We ended the service with our prayers led by Grace, Ryley and myself. It was another very proud moment for me in so many ways. Ryley was really nervous about saying the prayers yet expressed them beautifully. They were written by Jodi and I think they were perfect. Jodi has recently joined our little A² team and will hopefully be helping us with all our services going forward.



Which leads us nicely to what we have planned for the future A² services. We will continue to work on the structure of our services, ensuring that we're able to include as many people as possible in them. Some of you may have noticed that I am no longer down as the official leader of our A² services and instead the credit is put down to our team. I think it is very fair to say that Sunday was most definitely a team effort. We will all have a few days off before we start organising our next service which will be our Remembrance service in November. Initially I had not wanted to be involved with this service as it is a very emotional

time for me. Working as a nurse I had the privilege to meet so many people who had lived through the Second World War. Without their sacrifices, we would not be blessed with the life we have today so Remembrance Sunday for me is a very important day. However, I have been inspired by the work we have done so far and I'm happy to be there with our team although maybe this time I will have a bit part.



I am also very conscious that we are heading rapidly towards the festive period and have an awful lot of planning to do to get everything in place. This year we are not planning to do the Nativity Walk, instead Bev is organising some Nativity activities as part of the Mistletoe fair. She is in desperate need of chocolate to hand out to people. It would be lovely if you could buy a small box of chocolates and pass them on to her please. They do need to be individually wrapped as otherwise she may end up with a sticky mess. That said, knowing the craft activities that Wendy has created for them, I am quietly confident they will all end up in a sticky mess even with wrappers on the chocolates.

Talking of the festive period, we are about to start planning our Nativity Service which will be held on the morning of the Carol Service. Ryley had a wonderful idea for the theme. Her suggestion is that we do a "Jesus Christ the prequel" Christmas Special looking at the shepherds. So if you have any thoughts, ideas or inspiration that you would like to contribute to this, or to our Remembrance Service, please have a chat with one of the A² team. I am more than happy to use your input in our services, after all, it is an all-inclusive service.

So before I go, I would just like to remind you of Ray's homework which was to read and reflect on the Magnificat. On that note I will leave you in pieces.
