Letter from the Elders



It is that time of year when we think of the birth of our saviour Jesus Christ. In John 3 v 16 we learn that God's love for the world was so great that he sent his only son, Jesus, to die for humanity. The verse continues by explaining that this was so that anyone who believes in him will not perish but receive eternal life. This is an amazing gift from God, a gift of love for us all, a gift that eventually becomes the ultimate gift at Easter time that will never need to be repeated again. This is so important to remember.

Let's go back roughly a year before the birth of Jesus and from the gospel we learn that God blessed Zechariah and Elizabeth with the promise of a child in their old age. Doubt and surprise, perhaps understandably, and Zechariah became dumb, but sure enough Elizabeth has her son at the appointed time with conditions (look them up in the first chapter of Luke). Now while this is happening, God chooses Mary to become the mother of Jesus. What an honour. In this year two boys have been born in very special circumstances. John grows up to prepare the way for Jesus and Jesus grows up to save the world, to bring the love of God to everybody who acknowledges and worships Him as their saviour. Jesus' ministry is packed with miracles that no human could do and He told us so many times what was going to happen. He was crucified and died but rose again after three days just as He said He would and now He stands in Glory with the Father.

Christmas is a time for the family, a time to count our blessings, a time to remember the things that Jesus did for us all those years ago and still does today. It is the same Jesus, just as it is the same God. He is waiting for us now to give our heart to Him. In the very last verse of Matthew 28 Jesus says: *"And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age".* If you haven't given your life to Jesus yet, do it now.

May Christmas be a time of peace and love for you all.



Local church file sorting

We have a number of local church files inherited from District Councils which now need to be weeded and sorted before they are scanned and

digitized. This can be done from home or from the Synod Office. This needs to be a URC member with enough awareness to know what to keep and what can be destroyed.

All volunteers work within the context of a supportive staff team, a collaborative team on the Synod Executive, and full expenses reimbursed. All roles are open to ministers and lay people, and there are no age restrictions (except legal requirements for the Trust). Volunteer roles are normally for a maximum term of four years, which can be renewed if all parties wish. The Synod will follow a Safer Recruitment process for everyone wishing to serve, and the Synod reserves the right not to appoint every applicant.

DRAMA LLAMAS


Hello dear friends, I am delighted to be able to say for the first time this year, "Happy Christmas". Before we move on to my favourite time of year I would just like to reflect on our November service which was on Remembrance Day. I feel deeply honoured to have been able to lead the service as it has a very special meaning for me as I'm sure it does for many of you. Initially, I was not sure whether or not I would be able to lead the service and had asked if the A² (All Age) team would be able to take over. I had planned to help in the background but not to appear on stage and definitely not to lead the service. However, as you will have seen things turned out very differently.

We started by recording a few of our dear friends talking about their experience of war which we used as part of the introduction leading into the two-minute silence. I would love to have been able to share all of the video clips with you as I was blown away by the stories that I heard. However, we did have a very strict time frame to work to, in order to be ready for the silence at 11.00 am. I'm very grateful to Bobby and Ben, who both helped edit the clips that I had recorded and the final result was very moving, reminding us why we were there on Remembrance Sunday.

I would like to say a huge thank you to Andy Hall who led the worship music in such a powerful manner. I really felt that his input brought our service to life. There was a lot of planning behind the scenes to get everything on track to be ready at 11 o'clock for The Silence and even with that we were a little bit ahead of schedule. Thankfully, Andy was able to step up and ensure that the music finished at the right time. I'm not sure whether or not anyone noticed that Ben and Bobby, who were responsible for time management, kept indicating to myself and Andy when it was time to wrap things up ready for the Silence.

I felt the service flowed well, from the poignant stories that were shared, then moving through to God's message which I think Ray delivered beautifully. Then to top it all off we had a thought provoking poem as a summary for the whole service. Michael was unsure if he would find the inspiration he needed to write the poem, however his doubts were unfounded as I personally felt it was absolutely perfect and a beautiful tribute to those who fought for us.





One of the reasons I was unsure whether or not I would be able to lead the service was because I have connections with people who have fought for our freedom. I didn't want to let them down, or for our service to be as chaotic as our previous one. The day before, we met with Ben and Margaret who helped us with a run through of the first part of the service to see that everything was on track. Audrey joined us to have a run through of 'The Last Post' to ensure that we had our two-minute silence as close to 11 o'clock as possible. Thank you all for your commitment and hard work with this as Sunday wouldn't have been possible without you.

I am aware how different our Remembrance Sunday was to our previous A² services and not just because of the subject. I think one of the main differences was the preparation. Not just the 'behind the scenes' working that we did but also for me on a very personal level. When I arrived at church checked that everything was in place and then took myself to a quiet place for time with God. Usually I would have been nattering and organising everything which meant that I was focusing on everyone else rather than God. How can I carry God's message if I'm not focusing on Him? I am aware I have often said that I feel as if I am God's channel and it's Him working through me throughout all of the work I've done with both Drama Llamas and the A² team. Yet this time was different as I genuinely 100% handed it over to God. One of my main concerns was that I would be in tears throughout the service as this is what normally happens to me on Remembrance Sunday.



During the service I shared how I have been affected by people who have fought for our country and how I have seen the lasting impact this has on their mental well-being. I am very grateful that I cannot imagine what it would be like to live through a war let alone fighting one. There are numerous references in the Bible about how Jesus healed people on the inside not just on the outside. Maybe we need to find a way to help people to heal on the inside just as Jesus did.

We are rapidly heading towards Christmas, one of my favourite times of the year. I am quite excited about our next A² service which will be the Nativity. That said, it's on the same day as our Carol Service so if Drama Llamas are going to perform in both it's going to be a very busy day. I am sure the Drama Llama team will be up to it.

Ryley came up with a really good idea for the theme as she wanted to focus on the shepherds. I'm not quite sure if we could fill a whole service around the shepherds so I'm expanding it slightly, taking up Kevin's concept of bit-parts. We have already covered Mary and Joseph in our prequel series so for the Nativity we will focus on everyone else. I can't really say much more than that at the moment because we are very much in the planning stages. However I am very excited and hope that we will be able to bring the Nativity story to life for you.



I will end on a very personal note. As you may recall, back in May we had a new addition to our family, our gorgeous little dog Woody. I had not been looking forward to winter as I've thought this would be a really horrible time to be walking a dog. How wrong I was. Instead I've actually for the first time been slightly annoyed that the clocks went back. I have been really enjoying walking Woody first thing in the morning, leaving the house with our torches and his illuminated collar to go exploring in the forest. I cannot describe how beautiful it is to go out and watch the sunrise, bringing the world to life. It fills me with a real sense of peace and quite often I come home feeling inspired by God's word. Unfortunately I can't include a picture as its too dark so they don't come out very well. You'll need to trust me on this and maybe go exploring for yourself.

Merry Christmas my dear friends and I will see you next year.

ADVENT MESSAGE 2025

Advent begins in darkness, not to discourage us, but to help us recognise the light when it comes. This year, the darkness feels real enough. We live in a world still marked by significant uncertainty. Conflicts uproot lives and destabilise nations. The climate emergency

intensifies. Many people are burdened by economic pressure, political fatigue, or the experience of loneliness. Public discourse is often sharp and divisive. It can feel as though the world is holding its breath.

Advent speaks into precisely this kind of moment. The Scriptures remind us that God steps into human history not when everything is peaceful or predictable, but when people are longing for direction and hope. Isaiah's visions of peace were spoken into anxious times. John the Baptist's cry rang out in an occupied land. Mary received the angel's message in a world on edge. The Christ-child was born amid upheaval and fear. Advent is the story of God choosing to draw near precisely when life feels unsettled. God's faithfulness is not dependent on our stability, and divine presence is not restricted to times of ease. God comes to us even when we are still searching for our way.

Across Wessex Synod, I continue to see this living hope embodied in many small but significant ways: in congregations offering hospitality to neighbours; in communities supporting those struggling with the cost of living; in acts of care for creation; in people standing alongside refugees, the isolated, and the overlooked; and in the faithful rhythm of worship and prayer that sustains us week by week. These actions may not attract headlines, but they are unmistakable signs of light, and they matter.

Advent is not simply about waiting; it is about preparation. Preparing room for Christ in our priorities and relationships. Preparing space for peace in a world accustomed to conflict. Preparing space for generosity in a culture anxious about scarcity. Preparing space for hope when despair feels easier. This preparation is both spiritual and practical. It asks us to be honest about the world as it is, and courageous about the world as it could be.

Advent also invites us to resist the temptations that accompany difficult times: cynicism, apathy, and the belief that nothing can change. The child in the manger is God's declaration that even the most unpromising situations can become places of divine possibility. Hope does not deny reality; it transforms how we respond to it. The light of Christ does not erase the world's pain, but it reveals that darkness is not the whole story.
