On Saturday 21st February our candidate will conduct a worship



POSSIBLE NEW MINISTER

A Minister is coming to Cornerstone and Immanuel Southbourne on the weekend of 20th-22nd February to Preach-with-a-View. This is the procedure and opportunity we have to meet the Minister, share in worship with the Minister leading and preaching at the service, and then at a Church Meeting to discern through discussion and prayer and a secret vote by Members on whether to call the Minister to come and be our Minister. Everybody, whether a Church Member or not, is encouraged to participate in all of the programme below, though only Church Members may vote.

The programme is currently as follows:

Friday 20th February

“Meet the Minister” Social evening at 6.30pm - 8.30pm

The Minister introduces him/herself, then chats with small groups.

(Hopefully a summary profile will be available on paper to members and regular attendees on Sunday 15th February)

Saturday 21st February – Worship at 10.30am

Worship led and sermon preached by the Minister. (The service will NOT be streamed)

This will be followed by:

- Coffee/tea and a Soup Lunch with opportunity to talk with the Minister.
- Church Meeting after lunch (chaired by the Interim Moderator - Revd Andy Hall)
 - ◆ Question Time: questions to and from the Minister. Some questions in writing will be welcome.
 - ◆ Minister departs
 - ◆ Prayer, discussion, reflection
 - ◆ Secret vote by Church Members who were at the service on whether to issue a Call to the Minister. The voting papers will be sealed until the Immanuel Southbourne Church Meeting has voted on the Sunday afternoon.

The above programme is then repeated at Immanuel Southbourne with a Social evening on the Saturday evening, Worship on Sunday morning, followed by a Church Meeting with the vote on the Call by Church Members.

The counting at the two churches will then be done concurrently. The threshold of 85% of members present and voting is required to sustain a call both in total and from each church. The result of the voting at each Church will be announced and the Minister informed. The Minister will subsequently decide whether or not to accept the Call and may take as long as needed to do this.

At Cornerstone on Sunday 22nd February there will be a “**Prayer & Praise**” service at 10.30am followed by fellowship with tea/coffee.

Please pray for this whole process, for the Minister in preparing for the weekend and being guided as to what and how to share at the services and for Cornerstone and Immanuel churches that we will be able to clearly discern whether or not to call the Minister.





PRAYERS FOR FEBRUARY

Mondays

For the World: For peace in conflict zones, justice for the oppressed, provision for the poor, and healing for the planet.

John 3 v 16 presents bible readers with what is likely the purest, most straightforward summary of the good news of God's saving love that Jesus Christ brings to the world: *"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."* Jesus, speaking with the Jewish Pharisee Nicodemus, continued: *"For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him"* (John 3: 17).

Romans 10 verses 14 and 15.

"How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

Meanings

Hearing & Belief: Faith requires hearing the message of Christ.

Preaching & Sending: People can only preach if they are commissioned and sent by God.

Beautiful Feet: This phrase (from Isaiah 52 v 7) celebrates the messengers who bring the Gospel, signifying the vital role of evangelism in salvation.

In essence, Romans 10 v 14-15 emphasizes that God's plan for salvation involves both divine commission (sending) and human proclamation (preaching) to reach people with the Gospel. You receive salvation by putting your faith in Christ (a gift of grace), and good deeds flow from that saving faith, proving its reality.

Heavenly Father, You are the Alpha and Omega of our times. We ask for your love that conquers all.

You are our help through ages past, our hope for years to come,
Be thou our guard while troubles last, and our eternal home.

May our world leaders receive wisdom and guidance by Your spirit so that Your light (which is brighter than the noonday sun) shines through the darkness bringing peace through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Tuesdays

For the Church/Faith Communities: For guidance, unity, spiritual growth, and effective proclamation of the Gospel.

"Thou shall have no other gods but me" is the first of the Ten Commandments from the Bible (Exodus 20 v 3).

Our church's Statement of Faith - *We are a fellowship who believes in one God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit and the Bible as our authority. We believe that Jesus Christ died and rose again for us and that the Holy Spirit is at work on earth so that everyone who through faith asks for forgiveness will receive it. Those who do will have eternal life with God.*

When teaching from this, focus on core Christian doctrines like the Trinity, Jesus Christ (deity, humanity, crucifixion, and resurrection), and the Bible as God's Word, salvation by grace through faith, the role of the Holy Spirit, the Church, and the return of Christ, explaining these essentials clearly to build unity and guide members' lives and actions in glorifying God. Use the statement as a framework to define our church's identity, protect doctrine, and equip believers for service and witnessing.

Dear Lord, thank you for our Church and its rock of stability through all the changing times we have experienced together. May we be as beacons of light by God's grace drawing many into fellowship here as we seek to follow you Lord in all that we do. We lift our prayers to you now as a refreshing divine fragrance bringing peace in our Community.

Wednesdays

For Leaders and Nations: For wisdom, integrity, and just governance for those in authority. Matthew 5 v 16 (NIV) *"In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."*

Church leaders should lead by example, embodying Christ-like character (humility, love, integrity) while serving the congregation, focusing on a clear vision, fostering spiritual growth through Scripture, and empowering others, all grounded in prayer and dependence on God. Key actions include emphasizing biblical truth, communicating clearly, developing other leaders, and making decisions with momentum.

Thank you Father for your great wisdom and integrity and we ask that leaders will be gifted in such ways as to:-

Build Your kingdom here, Let the darkness fear,
Show Your mighty hand, Heal our streets and land,
Set Your church on fire, Win this nation back,
Change the atmosphere, Build Your kingdom here, we pray. Amen.

Thursdays

For those suffering: for the sick, lonely, grieving, anxious, or those in mental distress, asking for comfort, healing, and hope.

Isaiah 53 verse 5 says: *“But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed.”*

Jesus was wounded for our rebellions and crushed for our iniquities, allowing us to be healed and made right with God through His sacrifice.

Father, we pray for all those who are suffering in whatever way, that your healing hand will touch them and bring a sense of well being and a heart of praise. Blessed be your name on the road marked with suffering, when there's pain in the offering, blessed be your name. Amen.

Fridays

For our communities: for neighbours, friends, families, and those known to the worshippers, asking for mutual care and peace.

In John's Gospel Chapter 13 Jesus washed the disciples' feet. Jesus washed His disciples' feet to provide a powerful example of humble, sacrificial service and love, teaching them to serve one another as he served them.

The core verse for *"love your neighbour as yourself"* is found in Leviticus 19 v 18 in the Old Testament and is famously emphasized by Jesus in the New Testament, particularly in Matthew 22 v 39 and Mark 12 v 31, as the second greatest commandment after loving God. It instructs you to extend the same care, respect, and concern for others as you naturally have for yourself, fulfilling the law through active love.

Heavenly Father we pray that we may receive the gift of compassion and knowledge to bring your help to our neighbours that Your will may be done in all our ways. Through Jesus' mighty love, Amen.

Saturdays

For ourselves: for courage to live out faith, use gifts, and be instruments of love and generosity.

Galatians 5 v 22-23 (NIV) *“But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law.”*

The Apostle Paul describes “*the fruit of the Spirit*” as “*love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control*” (Galatians 5 v 22-23). These qualities reflect God’s character and the behaviour of those living according to God’s Spirit.

When we participate with God, we’re like new branches that are grafted into a living vine, which begin to yield the fruit of that vine (see John 15 v 1-11). So if God is loving, patient, and always emanating peace, then as we participate with God, we will bear that same spiritual fruit, like love, patience, and peace.

Help us, dear Father to have strength and wisdom to be able to *stand up for whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable, if anything is excellent or praiseworthy, we should think about such things*, according to Philippians 4 v 8. In the name of Jesus, Amen.

Sundays

Conclude with a prayer for all people and for guidance.

Matthew 6 v 9 - 13. This, then, is how you should pray:

“Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one.” For thine is the Kingdom, the Power and the Glory, for ever and ever, Amen.

Hello dear friends, I hope you all had a good start to the year. Last year ended on a high for me and 2026 has started in the same way with regard to the services. I think it's fair to say that our Nativity service went remarkably well. I am proud of our young people who stepped up to deliver a really grown up and thought provoking service. I would also like to

commend the members of our choir who are organised by Leander and Naomi. I was deeply moved to hear them sing in our Nativity service and I hear that they were equally as spellbinding in our Carol service. I am delighted to say that I have been able to secure their on-going input for the A² services although it won't be every month.



I am not going to apologise being an exceptionally proud mum. I am writing this on the Monday after our January A² service which as some of you may well have worked out, was led by my son Bobby. This was such a huge deal for him to take on as I don't think he had realized quite how much was involved behind the scenes in organising a service. However he stepped up to the challenge and in my very biased opinion did an amazing job. I was particularly impressed with his Message. He took us through the bible reading line by line and explained his take on the meaning of each verse. I loved his brutal honesty and how he related each of the points raised to his own personal journey. Now usually at this point I explore the Bible passage covered in our services in a little more depth. However this time I don't think I need to because I truly believe that Bobby was able to cover it beautifully. I will however remind you of some of the questions that he posed, in particular the one in his summary. Jesus told his disciples if they truly believed in him that they would be able to work miracles just as he had done. Bobby's question to you all was, do you have the same faith in Jesus that his disciples had? Bobby honestly said that he didn't think he had the same depth of faith which got me thinking, how much do I truly trust God?

Sunday was a perfect example of when I was putting my faith into action. I spent time with God handing the whole of the service over to him before I even got out of bed in the morning. I asked friends of mine to pray with me before we came to church. When it came to our pre-service



prayers, I asked a few friends to join us who wouldn't normally have been involved because I felt a need for as many people as possible to be praying for Bobby and the rest of the team. The prayers spoken then were absolutely beautiful and I truly believe they were God's word. It felt to me as if someone was able to articulate what was going on inside my heart which I could not express. So in that time I had absolute faith that God would look after us and that whatever happened in the service would be God's will not ours.



You know me, I always come up with silly ideas. Which is probably the best way to describe my idea of a blindfolded conga around the church. I thought this was a good way of showing people how God can lead us and how we sometimes need to have blind faith that He will do the right things for us. As a summary of the activity, I questioned whether or not we rely more on God during the straightforward walks in our life or do we turn to him more in the challenging times. I think yesterday showed me that I definitely can turn to God easily in the challenges. Which got me thinking whether or not I try and connect with him throughout my day-to-day living. Because surely if I did, then I would become a much more efficient carrier of God's message. I wouldn't just be carrying it on a Sunday morning in church and on a Friday evening during the Youth Bible Study. Instead I would be carrying it every minute of my day, while I'm walking the dog, talking to friends or phoning up about an invoice which is incorrect. All of these are opportunities for me to carry God's message. God's message isn't complicated, in fact it's really simple. In Matthew 22 v 37, Jesus states that we should '*Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your mind.*' It is that simple. All I have to do is love God and then everything else falls into place. All my worries and insecurities disappear. All my fear and anger is removed. Realistically I don't live in the little bubble with just God to focus on although at times I wish I did. I live in the real world. Quite often life steps in and distracts me from my connection with God. So maybe I need opportunities like our service to remind me that God is always listening and what I need to do is to reach out and pray.

In February we will not be having an A² service. I am sure you are aware that on Friday 20th and Saturday 21st February, a Minister will be coming to "preach with a view" to becoming our new Minister. On Friday 20th February, we will have a social event where we get to meet

the 'candidate' for the first time and have a natter with them, (not sure if that is the correct term to use but I could not think of anything else!) Then on Saturday they will be delivering a service for us which will be followed by a lunch and another opportunity for discussion. This will all culminate on Saturday afternoon when members are able to vote on whether or not they feel this is the right minister for our church. Only church members are able to vote. However for me personally, it is really important that I get to hear everybody's thoughts before I cast my vote. So regardless of whether or not you are a member please be involved in this process as it's really important to our church that we hear everyone's point of view. This is a really challenging time for us as we have managed to flourish as a church without a minister. I don't know about you but I personally find any change really difficult which is why it's really important for me to be part of this process. Whilst I know there is no perfect minister and one person is not going to be able to tick everybody's boxes, I do believe when we come together as a church family we will be able to tune ourselves into God's will and to make the right decision.



It's time for me to sign off now. I usually give you at least some random idea of what we're doing in the next A² service but because we have literally just less than 24 hours ago delivered our latest service, I genuinely haven't got a clue. What I do know is that Bobby is happy to continue on his journey carrying the Message and we also have some other talents flourishing within our church. So dear friends take care, enjoy and trust that God will always have your back.

A POPPY

The poem on the next page was written by Michael Rolph for the Remembrance Service last November. Many people have said that they would like to hear it again.

A POPPY

Poppies are quite beautiful, a delight unto the eye
How sad that that same beauty inclines mankind to cry.
In so many ways they symbolise what mankind use them for
We use them to remember all the men who fell in war.
When one sees a poppy, thoughts swiftly come to mind
The need to recall those fallen men that duty left behind.
The petals of each blossom stand proud and bright and red
Unlike the wartime fallen who sadly, now lie dead.

The stamens in real poppies are numerous and yellow
I think that represents the fear that assails the average fellow.
The fellow who bravely went to war, the man who we all cheer
The man prepared to give his all regardless of his fear.

Down below the stamen you'll find a darker part
It makes me think of the darkness inside the tyrant's heart.
The leaves of the poppy plant are shaped something like a blade
Serrated like a weapon of war, they make me afraid
For I now think of war, of guns and bombs and blood
Of fallen men, of pain and hurt, of misery and mud.
But, a poppy causes me to think not only of the loss
But also of the wondrous Lord who died upon the cross
A petal of the poppy so vibrant and curly
Much like our Lord's blood, shedding far too early.
All the men who fell in war, fathers, sons, and brothers
Did they, like Jesus on the cross give their life for others?
So when I look upon this flower, especially today
It reminds me of the need to act, to bow my head and pray
I ask God to remind mankind of the impact of division
May forgiveness and a love of justice become our new ambition
May God bless those impacted by war, those who have to mourn
May governments and rulers feel the need for a peaceful dawn.
Lord bless war's survivors, may they forget what they went through
May they seek God and know his love, Lord bring them all to you.
A poppy is a symbol of remembrance, hope and love
May it help us think of the fallen, but also of God above.

ELDERS ELECTION at the ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING on Sunday 29th March 2026

At our Annual General Meeting we have to consider the **Election of Elders**, who are also Trustees. In our church structure the government of our church rests with the Church Meeting, whose members elect Elders to share with the Minister (when in post) in the leadership of the local church. Elders are normally elected for a **four-year term** and will then be eligible for re-election for a further term of four years, following which they will not be eligible for re-election for one year.

This year there will be **one vacancy** in the team of nine elders. By the AGM, Margaret Yapp will have served the four years of her initial period of service, and so will be eligible for re-election.

The Elder's job description is given below so that you can see what is required of someone who is to be an Elder. There is also a booklet "They've asked me to be an Elder" with more detailed information. This is available in the Church Office or also at <https://urc.org.uk/your-faith/joining-the-ministries/become-an-elder/>

An elder is also a **trustee** of the church charity. This has always been the case, but was formalised when the church became a registered charity. A further document "Elders as Trustees" provides a short guide about what it does and doesn't mean to be a trustee. This is also available from the church office. However, please also speak with myself or other elder about any aspect of being an Elder.

It is both exciting and challenging to serve God in this way and we thank Him for the way He has been with and guided the Elders over many years and pray that He will guide us all in the election in March.

To be nominated as an Elder a Church Member must have been in membership for a minimum of two years. Nomination forms are available from the church office. The nomination form includes a space for a statement about the candidate to be made by the nominating Church Members. **The closing date for nominations is Sunday 15th March.** Please pray about this and use the nomination form if you feel led to propose someone to serve as an Elder.

I ask you to make it a priority to attend the **Annual General Meeting on Sunday 29th March after morning worship and lunch together**, and to prayerfully consider who we should elect to this key role.

JOB DESCRIPTION OF AN ELDER

Key role

- ◆ Share in the spiritual oversight and leadership of the church's mission, life and vision.
- ◆ Act on behalf of the Church Meeting insofar as it has entrusted its authority to the Elders to do so.
- ◆ As an Elder, you are also a **trustee** of our church charity and are responsible for the general management and control of the assets of the church.
- ◆ As a trustee also ensure that the church operates within the terms of its governing document, complies with charity law and meets the requirements of the Charity Commission.
- ◆ Collectively, elders are responsible for overseeing all aspects of safeguarding - ensuring everyone within the life of the church is kept safe.
- ◆ Collectively to support and provide pastoral care for all Ministry Leaders by receiving reports from Ministries and taking any action required.
- ◆ Collectively provide pastoral care of the church fellowship, and individually keep pastoral contact with a small number of the fellowship.
- ◆ Meet regularly at Elders Meetings to oversee the life of the church.
- ◆ Together act as an executive if decisions need to be made and it would be impracticable to do so at the Church Meeting.
- ◆ Share in the various Elder's duties that are necessary on a regular and occasional basis.

All, except the last of the above elements, would also be shared with the minister when in post.

Valentine's Day is named after **Saint Valentine**, a Christian martyr who lived during the Roman Empire in the 3rd century CE. There are several legends associated with him, including one where he defied Emperor Claudius II's ban on marriages for young men, believing that single men made better soldiers. Valentine continued to perform secret marriages for couples, which ultimately led to his arrest and execution. Another legend suggests that he healed the blind daughter of his jailer and sent her a letter signed "From your Valentine".

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
